Spreading Goodwill to our Members

Goodwill continues to play a significant role within our district. The many acts of caring, compassion and celebration are truly appreciated. The recipients are very happy to be remembered and acknowledged.

Each month, our committee prepares Birthday Cards for members 80 years and over. We are grateful to have additional volunteers who can share the responsibility for completing these cards. For the period from January to March, over 300 greetings were mailed to the general membership.

Milestone 90th. and 100th. birthdays have been celebrated for many years. We send flowers, a special card and certificate to commemorate this very special occasion. This year, we have 27 members who will be 90 years old. One member will be 100 years old and our oldest RTO member will celebrate 101 years. This is the highest number of birthday celebrants since inception. To date, four members have been honoured.

To usher in the holiday season, we sent Christmas arrangements to 82 members in Long-Term Care Homes, Retirement Communities, and a few Private Homes. In addition to this initiative, 27 Long-Term Care Homes and Retirement Communities received arrangements to be placed in common areas for the enjoyment of all residents. This was a tangible way to thank frontline workers for their dedication to the residents entrusted to them. Violet Blooms in Pickering created our colourful, seasonal arrangements.

Once again, Anna Huston prepared and mailed 140 Christmas Cards to District 28 members.

Anna's commitment never wavers.

Members have conveyed their gratitude for our Goodwill outreach in a variety of ways. Thank you, for your cards, phone calls and email messages. All notes received have been stored in permanent archives.

Throughout the year, we have participated in Zoom meetings organized by Member Services. These meetings are very useful as we are able to learn about Goodwill endeavours in other GTA districts. The districts vary in size with District 28 being one of the largest areas. The exchange of ideas is invaluable and gives us additional paths to consider and possibly implement.

We participated in a Zoom meeting with Elizabeth Roy, Mayor of Whitby. In the last Dustoff, I provided information about Lakeridge Gardens in Ajax which is a Long-Term Care Home. It was built and occupied very quickly. All stakeholders had to prioritize this project. The modular design of the structure was also very beneficial. SCAM ALERT!

Phone and Door-to-Door Scams are on the Rise

Seniors are often the target of scams because:
-They are usually home during the day
-They have the money and/or info the scammer and fraudsters are looking for
-Are generally more trusting of authority and information presented to them

typical scams include:
-Scammer acts as a lawyer, police officer or government official and seek owed money.
-Scammers pretend to be helping a loved one and request money to bail them out of jail.
-Scammers attempt to contact those on dating sites and build a relationship then ask for a "loan."
-Scammers try to get your personal information such as account, PIN and credit card details or SIN information.
-Scammers try to convince you that you have won a lottery and must pay money to release your winnings.

If it seems too good to be true or if you feel at all intimidated, call someone you trust.

SCAM ALERT

Tips for Protecting Yourself From Scammers

Never open the door or invite anyone into your home that you don't know or recognize. Use your peephole, chain lock or talk through a locked storm door if possible.

· End any conversation when you feel threatened or intimidated. Call someone you trust to discuss.

- Before you do or sign anything: Stop, think and then think some more. Call someone you trust to discuss if you feel at all unsure about what is going on.

Police, bailiff or government officials will NEVER attend your home or call you to collect money; and they will never have you wire money, use gift cards or deposit directly into a bank account.

· Create a safety word with family so if you are called asking to help, the person calling can provide the safe word.

· Anyone telling you NOT to tell anyone is a red flag and probably a scam. Call someone you trust.

· If they tell you that you must act quickly, remember that "Speed is Greed."

· Don't call back the number the fraudster provides you. Always call som

Heather Bradley

Kawartha Lakes Author



Heather is very passionate about the significance of shared reading with young students and the necessity to create books that provide authentic and meaningful information. She hopes that exposure to books at an early age will result in lifelong readers who will continue to enjoy and learn from their reading experiences in a variety of ways.

Throughout her professional career, Heather has interacted with students in a number of different

settings. When she worked at the Ontario Science Centre, she welcomed large numbers of eager participants each day. Heather shared her love of nature with them. However, Heather regretted that she was never able to follow up or continue the dialogue with these students.

A different career path was now in store for Heather. She became a teacher and was employed by the Durham District School Board for a number of years. While teaching at Mary Street School, Heather wrote and submitted an essay about Children's Literature. As a result, she was awarded the William C. McMaster Award from Scholastic Canada. Heather retired from full-time teaching in 2006. She continues to share her love of reading throughout the region and beyond with her visits to schools, libraries, and community centres.

In 2006, Heather published a book entitled <u>Don't Wait for Your Ship to Come In - Throw it a Line and Drag it to Shore.</u> It is described as a practical guide to living within your means while saving for your future. The main concept is that people can control their own financial destiny. This certainly indicates Heather's ability to research and provide pertinent information for a different audience.

As a classroom teacher, Heather's favourite time of day was when she could read to

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her students. Many teachers can relate to this sentiment. When Covid-19 became a reality, the visits to schools and other venues came to an abrupt halt. Heather missed sharing and interacting with students.

Heather made the decision to continue her writing with the focus being non-fiction picture books. There are very few written in this category. Heather commented on the qualities of a good picture book. "A good picture book is not only ageless and timeless, but it gives young readers the opportunity to let their imaginations go while they're learning." It is also important to make the book appealing for parents as they may be re-reading the book on many occasions.

When We All Get Together was published in September 2021. Heather describes the book as an entertaining way for young readers to boost their literacy skills and learn a thing or two about their natural environment. The chosen setting in the maple tree forest, and the plot involving animals indigenous to Canada provide accurate information for children. The teaching of collective nouns in the plot introduces new vocabulary and concepts to enrich student interest and comprehension. Heather worked closely with the illustrator to ensure a proper depiction of the animals and their natural habitat.

This book has received many accolades. In 2022, Heather travelled to Traverse City, Michigan to attend the Moonbeam Children's Book Awards. There were more than 1,500 entries from 22 countries. Heather was the recipient of a Silver Medal. The awards are presented in recognition of exemplary children's books and their creators dedicated to supporting childhood literacy and lifelong reading. Recently, Heather's book was reviewed by Goodreads and as a result she has received the Goodreads Royal Dragonfly Certificate.

Heather's second non-fiction picture book entitled <u>We Both Speak English But</u>... is nearing publication. Heather says it's a new twist on bilingualism and a gift to a cousin who lives in Ireland. People share close connections and experiences, but use different vocabulary in referencing these events.

Heather appreciates the support of local bookstores and libraries. Her book is available at the Kent Bookstore Lindsay, The Book Lady Fenelon Falls, Books Galore Port Perry, Friesen Press, Indigo, Amazon, & Barnes and Noble. Most local libraries carry the book as well.

Gardening adds years to your life, and LIFE to your years!

Despite the snow that remains on the ground, the longer hours of daylight have gardeners planning and dreaming of the bounty and the beauty that they can create. As an avid gardener and a member of the Board of the Oshawa Garden Club, I admire all gardening efforts, but when I saw the garden of a friend, fellow Oshawa Garden Club Board member, and fellow District 28 member, Jill Snape I was astounded! Jill's garden is the largest and most beautiful home garden I have ever seen, so I asked her to share a bit about her passion with our members.

A photograph of Jill at the age of 2, kneeling on a kneeling pad with a trowel in her hand hints at how early her love of gardening began. Growing up in England, Jill's parents were gardeners, part of the postwar Victory Garden movement, when growing food was considered to be more productive, but Jill preferred the beauty and colour of a flower garden. Her devotion to her garden really blossomed in adulthood, when time spent in the peace and solitude of the garden was calming, a way to regain mental balance, and to enjoy the pleasure of creating and watching things grow. Jill felt she "became lighter in the garden".

While Jill is self-taught, she credits a mentor named Jean who belonged to the Pickering Garden Club, with great advice that helped her hone her skills. When Jill moved to Oshawa in 2014, she chose a house that had a long back lot with a small stream running through it - good bones. There were some small existing garden beds, which were a starting point. In the nine years since then, she has created a veritable paradise with quiet places to sit and engage in what Jill calls "active staring". There are unique garden statues, a swing, paths that lead to enchanting fairy houses, a gazebo, water features and a spectacular peony bed that, in full bloom, would take your breath away!

Jill is a member of the Ontario Hosta Society, and loves the many varieties of Hosta, but peonies and dwarf evergreens rank among her favourites too. Evergreens give structure to a garden and provide four season interest, something to consider when planning a garden. She also recommends that before you start your garden, note how much sunshine each area gets, where existing trees and shrubs are, since their roots might prevent digging nearby, and decide what you will use the garden for (for example an entertainment area, private oasis, kids' playground etc.).


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These things will help you to determine how much to plant, what to plant and where.

Gardening might seem like a solitary hobby, but Jill has found that when she is out gardening, she chats with neighbours and people passing by who stop to talk gardening or to have a look at her plants. When she was new to Oshawa in 2014, she joined the Oshawa Garden Club and Probus to meet people and to feel she was getting involved and helping the community. She has made many friends, is on the OGC Board of Directors, leads the group that planted and maintains the beautiful gardens at Hearth Place, and helps in the gardens at Parkwood. Her garden has become well-known in Durham and is on every garden tour in the area, so for Jill, gardening has become a very social activity, rather than a solitary one.

While knee and hip problems have presented challenges, and the rabbits and squirrels can wreak havoc on the plants, Jill continues to find joy in the tranquility and creative expression that one gets from gardening. She says "Planting bulbs in the fall is faith in its greatest form!"

His life blood is oozing, his heart beating fast Yet he smiles at the prospect of death, For hasn't he fought both courageous and well


And held out 'til his very last breath?

The Social Scene

District 28 is happy to present a varied selection of social events and activities at low or no cost to our members. These include both in-person events and Zoom presentations. Events take place in a variety of locations throughout the Durham Region, with in-person events in the Spring and Fall and Zoom presentations through the winter so we can all stay out of the snow and remain safe and snug! Zoom events are provided free of charge to members and are recorded so that they can be posted for access during the month following the presentation. The link and information is emailed to members, and technical help is always available if needed. Member costs for live events are usually subsidized by \$15 courtesy of RTO-ERO District 28. Guests are welcome to all activities, so members are encouraged to invite friends and family. At each event, we run a 50/50 draw to benefit a charity. The current recipient is Hearth Place, Oshawa, which provides support to individuals and families dealing with cancer.

We also run two monthly clubs.

<u>Poetry Hub</u>, a poetry sharing group, is hosted by Penny Kutlik at 7:00 pm on the second Tuesday of each month.

<u>District 28 Book Club</u> is hosted by Charmaine Huculak on every second Wednesday of each month at 7:30 pm.

The year to date has been busy. We kicked off the year with our annual NO BELL LUNCH-EON to celebrate the first day of school with other RTOERO members at the Mandarin in Pickering. Over 125 happy members and their guests this year celebrated new and milestone retirees. In October, another record number of members attended the WINE & CHEESE SOCIAL. Wine and light snacks were offered at this late afternoon get-together attended by nearly 150 retired teachers and guests this year. This included the presentation of RTOERO Anniversary Certificates. A delicious catered PRE-CHRISTMAS LUNCHEON was

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held at Scugog Arena in November, to kick off the holiday season with record attendance of over 125 members, despite inclement weather.

To accommodate the winter weather, the holidays and everyone's busy schedules we offered a number of free Zoom presentations which are recorded and made available for members to access at their convenience if they cannot attend the live on-line event. However, considering it included a box of chocolates mailed to each participant's home and a presentation by Daniel Woodburn, a former Maître Chocolatier for Lindt, we could hardly complain. We closed out the season with a presentation at the end of March by Special Constable Darryl Rice of the DRPS designed especially for seniors, entitled *Frauds and Scams* with record high enrollment.

Returning to in-person events will kick off with a new initiative: a Complimentary Breakfast at Cora's on April 20th, to welcome all the new Members of 2022. We are hoping to make this a new annual event.

Our next event will be a MURDER MYSTERY and 3 COURSE DINNER at Kedron Dells on



May 2. And there's still time to register before the April 18th cut off! You are invited to dress the part of a Gangster or "Moll" for 3 chances at a prize draw. You can make up tables of friends for more fun!! At \$69 for members and \$84 for non-member guests with no need to travel far to have a great theatre experience and a wonderful meal with friends, this is already a popular event.

The annual RTOERO DISTRICT 28 GOLF TOURNAMENT will once again be held at Sunnybrae Golf Course, in Port Perry. This year we will be a little

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earlier, taking place on May 29th. A Continental Breakfast and nine holes of Golf will be the same price as last year with members paying \$45 and non-member guests at \$60. The same BBQ lunch will be offered @ \$20. A great time was had by all last year with prizes for everyone!

The AGM on June 6th is not strictly a social event, but since we are holding it at the Scugog Arena and offering a subsidized luncheon, once again catered by Basil Leaf Catering of Whitby, it is appropriate to just mention that date under this heading.

Travel Insurance Questions Answered

Does my RTOERO Travel Plan cover COVID-19 medical emergencies?

Yes. RTOERO members covered with Extended Health Care plan are covered for sudden and unexpected COVID-19 medical emergencies, even if there is an active travel advisory related to COVID-19 for the area in which you are travelling.

Does my travel insurance cover COVID-19 related trip cancellation, interruption or delay expenses?

As of May 1, 2022, coverage is available if you must cancel or interrupt your trip in the event that you or your travelling companion have a positive COVID-19 test or become ill with COVID-19 or die because of COVID-19.

Why have premiums increased in 2023?

In 2021, RTOERO announced a 3% premium reduction, and there was no premium increase in 2022. The surplus from 2020 and 2021 is now being invested back into the plan to manage premium increases, despite rising costs and increased use of the plan.

The Benefits Committee, chaired by Gayle Manley, recommends premium rates to RTOERO's elected board of directors. RTOERO uses all premiums exclusively to provide the most comprehensive and affordable benefits possible for members. With the long-term stability of plans in mind, rates are reviewed annually.

Do members still have a year to submit claims?

No. Starting January 1, 2023, the RTOERO policy requires you to submit your claims within six months from the date the expense was incurred. Expenses incurred on or before December 31, 2022 must by received by June 30, 2023. Rule of thumb: submit claims as soon as possible, lest you forget.

What is CloudMD?

Starting January 1, 2023, CloudMD replaced Teledoc as RTOERO's medical second-opinion service for Extended Health Care Plan participants. (Teledoc had

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earlier replaced Best Doctors.) CloudMD is a Canadian-based health solutions company.
